# Isaac Fabb

## Wynebodd Isaac Fabb rai o'r heriau bywyd caletaf ac mae'n awr yn ddysgwyr sy'n ysbrydoli sy'n esiampl i bobl ifanc yn cychwyn ar eu gyrfaoedd.

Mae'r dyn 22 mlwydd oed, a gafodd ddiagnosis o anhwylder diffyg canolbwytio a gorfywiogrwydd (ADHD) yn 17 oed, wedi goresgyn caethiwed i gyffuriau a cholli ei frawd yng nghyfraith i orddibyniaeth i ragori fel saer coed talentog.

Fe wnaeth y cyrifoldeb o ddod yn dad yn ei ardddegau ei ysgogi i newid ei fywyd. "Wrth edrych yn ôl nawr, rwy'n sylweddoli bod yr heriau wedi gwirioneddol fy helpu i ganolbwytio a bod yn fwy penderfynol i wneud yr hyn yr oeddwn am ei wneud," dywedodd Isaac o Abertawe.

Er gwaethaf yr heriau hyn a gadael yr ysgol heb unrhyw gymwysterau ffurfiol, roedd Isaac yn benderfynol o gael gyrfa, ac, yng nghanol caethiwed i sylweddau, yn ddi-ildio aeth ati i ymgeisio am grysiau coleg amrywiol.

Ar ôl ychydig o geisiadau afluwyddiannus, oherwydd ei gyflwr yn bennaf, fe wrthododd roi'r ffidil yn y to a chafodd le ar gwrs adeiladu aml-sgil yng Ngholeg Gŵyr Abertawe.

Ffynnodd ar y cwrs a flwyddyn yn ddiweddarach sicrhodd waith gyda Chyngor Dinas Abertawe fel prentis saer, gan gyflawni ei nod o weithio yn yr yrfa o'i ddewis gan ddal i ddysgu.

Roedd dysgu yn ei waith yn gweddu'n well i Isaac, a llwyddodd i gael canlyniadau eithriadol a hefyd ei TGAU mathemateg wrth gwblhau ei gwrs aml-grefft.

*"Er bod rhai meini tramgydd, nid oedd dim yn rhoi mwy o fodhad na chyflawni gyrfa yr oeddwn yn meddwl ar un adeg ei bod ymhell tu hwnt i'm cyrraedd. Wrth edrych yn ôl nawr, rwy'n sylweddoli bod yr heriau wedi gwirioneddol fy helpu i ganolbwytio a bod yn fwy penderfynol i wneud yr hyn yr oeddwn am ei wneud."*

**Isaac Fabb has faced some of the toughest life challenges and is now an inspirational learner who is a role model for young people starting out in their careers.**

The 22-year-old, who was diagnosed with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) at 17, has overcome drug addiction and the loss of his brother-in-law to addiction, to excel as a talented carpenter.

The responsibility of becoming a teenage father motivated him to change his life. "Looking back now, I realise that the challenges truly helped me focus and be more determined to do what I wanted to do," said Swansea-based Isaac.

Despite these challenges and leaving school with no formal qualifications, Isaac was determined to gain a career and, against a backdrop of addiction, he relentlessly applied for various college courses.

After a couple of unsuccessful attempts, largely down to his condition, he refused to give up and gained a place on a multi-skill construction course with Gower College Swansea.

He flourished, and a year later secured employment with Swansea City Council as an apprentice carpenter, achieving a goal of working within his chosen career whilst learning.

On-the-job learning proved a better fit for Isaac, gaining outstanding results and also achieving his maths GCSE whilst completing his multi-trade course.

Achieving what he thought was an impossible feat led to the college naming him as their Foundation Apprentice of the Year, and his employer incorporating him into their employability team that encourages young people to consider apprenticeships.

He is now undertaking his Level 3 with predicted grades of a double distinction and is in discussion to undertake an HNC in Construction Management.

Isaac reflected: "Though the five-year journey was bumpy, I am eager to continue and embrace the next challenge."

"I can say that knowing I was going to be a father at such an early age spurred me to not only kick the addiction but to stand up to be the young adult I needed to be."

With a bright future now ahead of him, Isaac is aiming to reach the top of his profession and has earned plenty of respect along the way.

Medi Williams, Commercial Bid Specialist at Gower College Swansea, said: "I nominated Isaac on behalf of the college because he is an inspirational learner who has become a role model for those who may not have thought adult education was them."

**Mae penderfyniad Alan Hardie i barhau yn gadarnhaol a chadw ei ymennydd yn brysur ar ôl dioddef strôc ddwy flynedd yn ôl yn 56 oed yn ysbrydoli pawb sy'n dod ar ei draws.**

Ar y dechrau roedd y strôc wedi gadael Alan, 57, â gwendid ar ei ochr dde ac anawsterau siarad ysgafn. Mae'n parhau ei therapi ei hun i wrthweithio yn erbyn ei anawsterau symud.

Roedd yn teimlo'n ynysig nes iddo ymuno â dosbarth ysgrifennu i oedolion oedd yn cael ei redeg gan Wasanaeth Dysgu Gydol Oes Dinas a Sir Abertawe yn Llyfrgell Gorseinon y llynedd.

Clywodd am y dosbarth trwy Grŵp Goroeswyr Strôc Abertawe a dywed bod ysgrifennu am ei strôc a'r anhwylder straen ôl-drawmatig (PTSD) wedi bod yn "eithriadol o gathartig".

Mae Alan wedi bod yn dioddef o PTSD ers mwy na 30 mlynedd ers iddo fynd at ddamwain erchyll ar y draffordd pan oedd yn Dechnegydd Meddygol yn y Fyddin. Combat Stress, elusen iechyd meddwl cyn-filwyr, wnaeth roi diagnosis y cyflwr iddo, a wnaeth ei adael yn isel iawn.

Roedd wedi gwasanaethu cyn hynny gyda Chorfflu Meddygol Brenhinol y Fyddin, gan gymhwys fel Uwch Nyrs Staff cyn dychwelyd i fywyd tu allan i'r lluoedd a dod yn Gynghorydd Genetig i'r GIG, swydd yr oedd wrth ei foddy ynddi hyd at ei strôc.

"Mae ysgrifennu Alan yn dod o'r galon, yn ddoniol ac weithiau yn dorcalonnus," dywedodd ei diwtor dosbarth ysgrifennu Carolyn Jones, a wnaeth ei enwebu.

"Ysgrifennodd am ei brofiad o gael strôc ac effaith hynny arno ef a'i wraig, Kath. Fel yr oedd yn darllen ei waith i ni, roeddem yn chwerthin a chrio yn eu tro.

"Mae wedi gorfol derbyn ymddeol yn gynnar, rhywbeth nad oedd yn ei ddisgwyl ar y pwnt hwn yn ei fywyd. Hyd yn oed ar ddyddiau pan nad yw'n teimlo'n dda, mae'n llawn positifrwydd ac mae'n mynd at bob tasg ysgrifennu'n llawn pwrrpas. Mae Alan yn garedig a chefnogol i aelodau eraill y dosbarth bob amser."

Ar ôl y strôc, roedd Alan yn benderfynol o beidio â gadael i negyddiaeth reoli ei feddyliau. "Peidiwch â'm camddeall, roedd hyn yn ddilgwyddiad trawmatig, ond roedd yn rhaid i mi ei dderbyn a symud ymlaen," dywedodd.

"Roeddwn eisiau gweithgaredd nad oedd ganddo unrhyw gysylltiad â'm strôc, a fyddai'n cadw fy meddwl yn effro a'm symud allan o fod yn ynysig trwy gyfarfod pobl wahanol. Mae cychwyn ar y cwrs ysgrifennu creadigol wedi normaleiddio fy mywyd, gan fod gennyl yn awr gysylltiadau cymdeithasol pwysig, cyfeillgarwch newydd ac rwy'n dysgu ar yr un pryd.

"Gobeithio, rhyw ddydd, y gallaf ysgrifennu am fy mhrofiad o gael strôc ac annog aelodau o Grŵp Goroeswyr Strôc Abertawe i rannu eu profiadau hefyd i helpu eraill mewn sefyllfa debyg."

**Alan Hardie's determination to remain positive and keep his brain active after suffering a stroke two years ago at the age of 56 is inspiring everyone who comes into contact with him.**

The stroke initially left Alan, 57, with right-sided weakness and mild speech difficulties. He continues his own therapy to counter mobility difficulties.

He felt isolated until he joined a creative writing class for adults run by the City & County of Swansea Lifelong Learning Service at Gorseinon Library last year.

He heard about the class from Swansea Stroke Survivors Group and says writing about his stroke and post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) has been "extremely cathartic".

Alan has also suffered from PTSD for more than 30 years since attending a harrowing motorway accident as an Army Combat Medical Technician. The condition, which left him very depressed, was diagnosed by Combat Stress, the veterans' mental health charity.

He had previously served with the Royal Army Medical Corps, qualifying as a Senior Staff Nurse before returning to civvy street and becoming an NHS Genetic Counsellor, a job he loved until his stroke.

"Alan's writing is heartfelt, funny and at times heart-breaking," said his creative writing class tutor Carolyn Jones, who nominated him.

"He has written about his experience of having a stroke and the impact on him and on his wife, Kath. As he was reading his work to us, we were by turns laughing and crying.

"He has had to come to terms with early retirement, something he was not expecting at this point in his life. Even on days when he doesn't feel well, he radiates positivity and approaches each writing task with purpose. Alan is unfailingly kind and supportive to the other class members."

After the stroke, Alan was determined not to let negativity dominate his thoughts. "Don't get me wrong, this was a traumatic event, but I had to accept it and move on," he said.

"I wanted an activity that was totally unrelated to my stroke, which would keep my mind active and move me out of isolation by meeting different people. Starting the creative writing course has normalised my life, as I now have important social interactions, new friendships and I'm learning at the same time.

"Hopefully, one day, I can write about my stroke experience and encourage members of the Swansea Stroke Survivors Group to share their experiences as well to help others in a similar situation."

Ar ôl cyfnod hir yn gwella, dychwelodd at addysg yn ei 30au i ennill TGAU a magodd yr hyder i gychwyn cymhwyster Lefel 2 Gweinyddu Busnes gyda Choleg Caerdydd a'r Fro. Cwblhaodd y cymhwyster ddu fis yn gynnar ac mae wedi symud ymlaen i Lefel 3.

Mae Eve, 32, gweinyddydd busnes i lechyd Cyhoeddus Cymru, wedi symud ymlaen i gyflog Band 4 yn y gwaith, ar ôl dau ddyrchafiad ac mae wedi bod â'i llygad ar gymhwyster mewn cynllunio digwyddiadau, sy'n rhan allweddol o'i gwaith.

"Yr hyn sy'n gwneud Eve yn wahanol i'w ei hangerdd dros helpu eraill, fel rhan o'r cyfraniad ehangach y mae'n ei wneud yn ei swydd yn lechyd Cyhoeddus Cymru i gefnogi newid i wella bywydau eraill. Mae ei gwaith yn cefnogi meysydd allweddol yn yr adran gofal sylfaenol, gan gynnwys cefnogi cynhwysiad iechyd ac anghyfartaledd."

**Resilient Eve Salter believes she's better prepared to learn as an adult than she ever was as a teenager and is now developing a career to provide a better life for herself and her family.**

As a single parent teenager, she felt left behind as her friends went to college or university, eventually getting good jobs and opportunities.

Worrying about her future career prospects and the responsibility of being a parent at such a young age drove Eve into severe depression. Some life choices left her with post-traumatic stress disorder which damaged her confidence and self esteem.

After a long recovery, she returned to education in her 30s to complete GCSEs and plucked up the courage to begin a Level 2 Business Administration qualification with Cardiff and Vale College. She completed the qualification two months early and has progressed to Level 3.

Eve, 32, a Public Health Wales business administrator, has progressed to a Band 4 salary at work, after two promotions and is considering a qualification in event planning, a key part of her job.

"If you're not careful as a young mother, you can lose your identity but returning to learning has really helped to turn everything around," she said. "It's only now that my daughter is older that I have the opportunity to think about my career. I want to set a good example to her and inspire other young mums to do the same."

"Going back to education as an adult is scary and may have felt like I was behind everyone else. However, with maturity and life experience on my side, it has been an interesting and exciting journey at a time in my life when I feel completely ready and committed to learn.

"Support and study leave from Public Health Wales, has enabled me to complete the work without worrying about childcare. Without this support and a work-based learning opportunity, I wouldn't be in the position I am in today."

Her nominator Michele Gate, formerly of Cardiff and Vale College, said: "Eve's unwavering commitment to personal growth and her infectious passion for learning has left an indelible mark on those around her.

"What sets Eve apart is her passion for helping others, as part of the wider contribution she makes in her role at Public Health Wales to support change for the betterment of others. Her work supports critical areas within the primary care division, including supporting health inclusion and inequalities."

So says Nikki Workman-Smith, Cardiff and Vale College (CAVC) Family Learning Course Tutor, who nominated Lucy for an Inspire! Award.

"From facing adversities early in life to emerging as a beacon of inspiration, Lucy's story is one of unwavering perseverance and profound transformation," she added.

Leaving education at 15 and navigating parenthood whilst living in a hostel, Lucy took on a series of part-time jobs just to make ends meet, she struggled with anxiety and depression.

The turning point came when she met Leanne Rutter, Family Liaison Officer at Bryn Hafod Primary School, Llanrumney.

Leanne introduced Lucy to Family Learning and her confidence and motivation soared as she completed a series of courses. She secured a voluntary post as a Teaching Assistant in the school which has developed into a job as a Dinner Technician.

Aiming to become a Teaching Assistant, she hopes to start a Level 3 Childcare course.

"I always loved school, but when I fell pregnant, I was forced to leave and stopped my education," said Lucy. "Over the last 20

years, my confidence in my own abilities – outside being a mum – massively diminished, so completing these courses has been transformative.

"I feel proud of what I've achieved. It's boosted my self-esteem and focus – and most importantly has given me new friends. For the first time in years, I'm socialising and enjoying my life. I've got a passport; I'm helping to run a book club and I'm part of the new school Parent Teacher Association. It feels like my life has started."

Lucy described the Family Learning programme as a "guiding light" and a "lifeline", offering a glimmer of hope to those lost and unsure of a future for themselves.

"With each course, I shed a layer of doubt and insecurity, emerging stronger and more self-assured.

"To anyone who is stuck in a rut or struggling at the moment, I offer these words of encouragement: 'You are not alone. With the right support and determination, even the darkest of nights can give way to the dawn of a new day. Trust in the journey, embrace the opportunities that come your way and never underestimate the resilience of the human spirit.'

Gall newid gyrrfa yn 38 oed o swydd am oes gyfforddus ym myd manwerthu i ansicrwydd y diwydiant ffilm ymddangos yn ffolineb, ond dywed Dan Morgan mai dyma'r newid callaf a wnaeth erioed.

Mewn mater o wythnosau, aeth Dan o Orseinon, o reoli cylledebau o filiynau lawer o bunnoedd a goruchwyliau staff mewn swydd reoli yn Tesco, i gymryd archebion cinio ar setiau cynhyrchu gan weithwyr proffesiynol 15 mlynedd yn iau nag ef, ond nid yw wedi difaru o gwbl.

Cychwynnodd taith y siaradwr Cymraeg rhugl gyda BA mewn Ymarfer Cyfryngau Proffesiynol o Athrofa Abertawe yn 2007, yna sefydlodd ei fusnes ffotograffiaeth ei hun am dair blynedd.

Yna gwnaeth y penderfyniad poenus i gamu allan o'r byd creadigol ac i fanwerthu, gan symud i reoli o fewn 18 mis a threulio'r 11 mlynedd nesaf yn creu enw da am fod yn llawn cymhelliant, yn wydn a chydweithredol, gan gael profiad mewn arwain ac ymgysylltu â thimau.

Ond roedd ei ddyhead am gael gyrrfa ar sail ei awch artistig yn swnian o'i fewn.

Dyweddodd: "Roeddwn yn credu bod y cyfle i ddilyn fy angerdd trwy gydol fy oes o weithio yn y diwydiant ffilm wedi hen fynd. Roedd gennyl gysur sicrwydd swydd, pensiwn a gwyliau penodol gyda Tesco, ond nid dyna oeddwn i ei eisiau o'm bywyd, felly fe wnes i ddechrau edrych beth oedd ar gael."

"Roeddwn yn credu bod y cyfle i ddilyn fy angerdd trwy gydol fy oes o weithio yn y diwydiant ffilm wedi hen fynd. Fe gymerodd 15 mlynedd yn hwy nag yr oeddwn wedi gobeithio, ond yn 40 mlwydd oed, o'r diwedd rwyf lle'r oeddwn i fod."

**Changing careers at the age of 38 from a comfortable job-for-life in the world of retail to the uncertainty of the film industry may seem foolhardy, but Dan Morgan says it is the wisest move he has ever made.**

In a matter of weeks, Gorseinon-based Dan went from managing multi-million-pound budgets and overseeing staff in a Tesco management role, to taking lunch orders on production sets from professionals 15 years his junior, but he hasn't regretted a single day.

The fluent Welsh speaker's journey started with a BA in Professional Media Practice from Swansea Institute in 2007, followed by establishing his own photography business for three years.

He then made the painful decision to step out of the creative world and into retail, moving up to management within 18 months and spending the next 11 years building a reputation for being motivated, resilient and collaborative, gaining experience in leading and engaging teams.

But the burning desire to make a career from his artistic appetite nagged from within.

He said: "I believed that the opportunity to follow my lifelong passion of working in the film industry had long since gone. I had the comfort of job security, pension and fixed holidays with Tesco, but it just wasn't what I wanted from my life, so I started to look at what was available."

Dan thought that age was against him as he sought to develop a career in the film industry.

Sgil Cymru's CRIW Apprenticeship did not have any age barriers, this led to his life-changing decision in February 2022.

Nadine Roberts, Sgil Cymru's Head of Training, recalls: "The risks involved in changing career at 38 were enormous, but we're so proud of Dan in proving that it is possible."

His first taste of production on the Creative and Digital Media Apprenticeship was a three-month placement as a runner with Gorilla, Wales' largest post production company.

A placement followed as a sound trainee on Channel 4's *On the Edge*, before Dan flourished on the Disney/Hulu HETV £84 million drama *Black Cake*, working as a production assistant to learn how the show was brought to the starting line.

His last placement with CRIW was as a production runner on the ITV drama *Until I Kill You* and, on completing his apprenticeship, he worked as production manager assistant on BBC's *Casualty*, production secretary on Channel 4's new zombie drama *Generation Z*, BBC's *Dr Who* and then assistant production co-ordinator on Craig Roberts' new feature film, *The Scurry*.



## Hyb Cymunedol Cwmpawd Compass Community Hub



Mae'r angen cynyddol i ddarparu hyfforddiant a chefnogaeth i unrhyw un 16 oed a hŷn ar draws ardal Cyngor Bwrdeistref Sirol Merthyr Tudful wedi arwain at ganolfan ddysgu flaengar sydd wedi ymgysylltu â mwy na 1,000 o bobl yn y flwyddyn ddiwethaf yn unig.

Ail-frandiwyd Hyb Cymunedol Cwmpawd yn Ebrill 2023 ac mae'r ganolfan yn y Gurnos wedi ehangu mynediad i breswylwyr yn yr ardal leol, gan fabwysiadu dull hyblyg i estyn allan i'r gymuned.

Roedd y lansiad yn digwydd yr un pryd â chyfraniad o arian cyfalaf ar gyfer adnewyddu gan Lywodraeth Cymru a wnaeth droi un bloc hyfforddi yn llety byw â chymorth i bobl ifanc yn gadael gofal. Roedd hyn yn helpu i'w dwyn yn nes at ddysgu a chynnydd gyda'r Hyb ar eu trothwy.

Mae amrywiaeth o hyfforddiant a chymorth yr Hyb yn helpu dysgwyr i gynyddu eu sgiliau cysylltiedig â gwaith, gwneud cysylltiadau, gwella eu hyder a chael cyngor a chefnogaeth. Cynigir gweithdai, cyrsiau a digwyddiadau cymunedol ar ddyddiau ac amseroedd amrywiol trwy gydol yr wythnos. Mae'r holl gyrsiau, gweithdai a chymorth am ddim.

Mae'r cyfleuster yn unigryw yn y fwrdeistref gan nad oes unrhyw gyfleuster dysgu oedolion arall yn cynnig siop un stop o'r fath sy'n cynnwys ardaloedd adeiladu, gweithdai cerameg, canolfan TG, hyfforddiant manwerthu a dwy ystafell hyfforddi fawr.

**The growing need to provide training and support to anyone aged 16 and over across the Merthyr Tydfil County Borough Council area has led to an innovative learning centre that has engaged with more than 1,000 people in the past year alone.**

Compass Community Hub was rebranded in April 2023 and the Gurnos-based operation has widened access to residents in the local area, adopting a flexible approach to reach out to the community.

The launch coincided with an injection of capital funding for refurbishment from Welsh Government that converted one training block into supported living accommodation for young people leaving care. This helped to bring them closer to learning and progression with The Hub located right on their doorstep.

The Hub's range of training and support helps learners to build their work-related skills, make connections, improve their confidence and get advice and support. Workshops, courses and community events are offered on various days and times throughout the week. All courses, workshops and support are free.

The facility is unique within the borough as no other adult learning centre offers such a one-stop-shop which includes construction areas, ceramics workshops, an IT suite, retail training and two large training rooms.

Leanne Williams, from Compass Community Hub, said: "The team has worked hard to build up a range of courses and to develop an ever-changing offer that encourages everyone into some

form of adult learning, whatever their levels, interest and abilities, including some who may be neuro divergent, have poor mental health or low skills."

The project also has an ex-offender mentor to support them in moving forward in their lives, reducing the risk of reoffending through access to learning and sustainable employment.

More than 100 referrals are received every month from either partner organisations or individuals, and more than half of the learners have completed a formal qualification.

Relationships have been built with other providers such as the University of South Wales and Adult Learning Wales to deliver some of their learning programmes from The Hub.

Plans for the future include a community café where disabled individuals with learning difficulties can volunteer, work and learn in the field of hospitality and catering.

There is also an appetite to deliver "Compass in the Community" workshops at other community buildings right across Merthyr Tydfil.

Mae Sophie Dey yn "barod i herio'r byd" a chyflawni ei breuddwyd o ddod yn nyrs, ar ôl profi plentyndod heriol iawn.

Wedi ei maethu yn dair oed, fe'i mabwysiadwyd ddyflynnyd yn ddiweddarach ac yn y diwedd roedd yn cael ei haddysgu gartref, heb arholiadau ffurfiol, o 10 oed ymlaen gan y rhieni wnaeth ei mabwysiadu.

"Er fy mod yn gallu dysgu gartref, roedd rhwystrau o ran fy natblygiad cymdeithasol ac emosiynol a wnaeth fy ngadael yn bryderus iawn yn gymdeithasol ac roedd fy hyder yn brin iawn," esboniodd Sophie, 19, sy'n byw ger Llandrindod.

Ar ôl i'r gwasanaethau cymdeithasol ymneud â'i hachos, cofrestrodd Sophie yng Nghampws Aberhonddu Grŵp Castell-nedd Port Talbot yn Ionawr 2023, y gwnaeth ei ddisgrifio fel "cychwyn fy nhaith addysgol gyffrous".

Yn fuan ar ôl ei phen-blwydd yn 18 oed, gadawodd ei theulu mabwysiedig a symud at ofalwr maeth blaenorol, gyda chymorth y gwasanaethau cymdeithasol a thiwtoriaid y coleg.

"Ers gadael cartref, mae bywyd wedi newid yn fawr er gwell ac rwyf nawr yn barod i herio'r byd!" dywedodd.

Mae Sophie wedi cwblhau cyfres o gymwysterau Mathemateg a Saesneg, gan gynnwys TGAU, a chwrs Lefel 2 lechyd, Gofal Cymdeithasol a Gofal Plant Cyfun.

*"My advice to any other young person who has experienced trauma in their lives is, just because you have had a rough start, it doesn't define you as a person. Have the confidence to pursue your hobbies, beliefs and passions in order to become the best version of yourself."*

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**Sophie Dey is "ready to take on the world" and achieve her dream of becoming a nurse, having experienced a very challenging childhood.**

Fostered at the age of three, she was adopted two years later. She was home schooled, without formal exams, from the age of 10 by her adoptive parents.

"Whilst I was able to learn at home, there were barriers to my social and emotional development which left me both socially anxious and greatly lacking in confidence," explained Sophie, 19, who lives near Llandrindod Wells.

Following the involvement of social services, Sophie enrolled at NPTC Group's Brecon Campus in January 2023, which she described as "the start of my exciting educational journey."

Soon after her 18th birthday, she left her adoptive family and moved in with a previous respite foster carer, supported by social services and college tutors.

"Life has drastically changed for the better and I am now ready to take on the world!" she said.

Sophie has completed a series of Maths and English qualifications, including GCSEs, and a Level 2 Combined Health, Social and Childcare course.

She is progressing to the Level 3 Health and Social Care qualification alongside an advanced Welsh Baccalaureate, with the aim of doing an Apprenticeship in Nursing. She has an ambition to become either a mental health or children's nurse.

"If I were to give advice to any other young person who has experienced trauma in their lives, I would say just because you have had a rough start, it doesn't define you as a person," added Sophie.

"Have the confidence to pursue your hobbies, beliefs and passions in order to become the best version of yourself and prove that you can do it, that you are successful and now the world is your oyster."

Claire Bumford, Sophie's lecturer, said: "In over 25 years of teaching, I don't think I have ever come across such an inspirational young lady. She wants to become a nurse because, in her own words, 'it would be nice to help other people'. That understatement sums up Sophie.

"She's studying at college to hopefully make her dream a reality, despite having had several major upheavals in her life. I have no doubt that Sophie will succeed and gain the qualifications she needs to achieve her dream."

Profodd Daniel Minty drawsnewidiad diwylliannol ers dechrau dysgu Cymraeg yn 2022. Mae Daniel, sy'n byw yng Nghaerdydd, wedi mynd o wybod dim ond ychydig eiriau o Gymraeg i siarad yr iaith wyth awr y dydd, bum diwrnod yr wythnos fel Swyddog Datblygu Cymunedol Menter Iaith Casnewydd.

Mae'n disgrifio cael y swydd eleni fel un o "lwyddiannau mwyaf fy mywyd".

"Ar ôl dysgu Cymraeg am 18 mis, rwyf yn gweithio nawr trwy gyfrwng y Gymraeg, yn helpu cymunedau yn yr ardal i ddefnyddio'r iaith tu allan i'r dosbarth," dywedodd. "Dyma un o'r newidiadau diwylliannol mwyaf yn fy mywyd. Rwyf mor ddiolchgar am hyn ac am helpu eraill i wneud yr un peth â fi."

Wedi ei fagu yng Nghwm Rhymni, roedd Daniel yn falch o fod yn Gymro ond yn anaml yr oedd yn clywed y Gymraeg yn cael ei siarad yn y gymuned nag yn yr ysgolion yr oedd yn eu mynchu.

Trwy wirfoddoli yng Ngwyl Sŵn yng Nghaerdydd yn 2014 a gwrando ar gerddoriaeth Gymraeg fe ail daniwyd ei ddiddordeb. Creodd wefan dan yr enw Minty's Gig Guide i hyrwyddo gigiau Cymraeg ar draws De Cymru a rhedodd nifer o ymgyrchoedd llwyddiannus.

Mae wedi cyflwyno gyda Bethan Elfyn ar BBC Radio Wales, ar ôl gweithio i'r gorfforaeth fel cynorthwydd darlleu yn y gorffennol.

Cofrestrodd Daniel ar gwrs Mynediad Cymraeg ym Medi 2022 ac nid yw wedi edrych yn ôl. Llwyddodd i gael y cymhwyster Sylfaen, mae'n gweithio tuag at y lefel Canolradd ac mae'n bwriadu symud ymlaen i'r lefel Uwch.

Dywed bod ganddo "ddyled fawr" i'w diwtoriaid Elin Prys Davies a Meilyr ap Ifan yn Dysgu Cymraeg Caerdydd a Nigel Rees yng Ngholeg Sir Gâr am eu hanogaeth a'u hangerdd dros yr iaith.

Yn awyddus i rannu ei angerdd ei hun dros y Gymraeg, mae wedi helpu dysgwyr eraill trwy drefnu grwpiau sgrwsio anffurfiol a darllen a hyd yn oed ysbyrdoli ei chwaer a'i prawd yng nghyfraith i ddysgu'r iaith.

Elin wnaeth annog Daniel i ymgeisio am swydd gyda Menter Iaith Casnewydd a'i enwebu ar gyfer y wobr hon.

"Yn ddiamau mae dysgu Cymraeg wedi trawsnewid bywyd Daniel," dywedodd. "Mae'n unigolyn llawn egni sy'n ysbyrdoli pawb o'i gwmpas i ddysgu Cymraeg. Mae ei frwd frydedd yn heintus. Ei nod yw hybu, annog ac ysbyrdoli preswylwyr Casnewydd i ddysgu Cymraeg, defnyddio'r sgiliau iaith sydd ganddynt, a mwy na dim, gwrionti ar yr iaith a mwynhau ei siarad."

## **"Immerse yourself in the richness of the Welsh language – the experience will change your life."**

Daniel Minty has experienced a cultural transformation since starting to learn Welsh in 2022. Daniel, who lives in Cardiff, has gone from knowing only a few words of Welsh to speaking the language eight hours a day, five days a week as Menter Iaith Casnewydd's Community Development Officer.

He describes securing the job this year as one of the "biggest successes of my life".

"After learning Welsh for 18 months, I now work through the medium of Welsh, helping communities in the area to use the language outside the classroom," he said. "This is one of the biggest cultural changes in my life. I am so grateful for this and want to help others to do the same thing as me."

Brought up in the Rhymney Valley, Daniel was proud to be Welsh but rarely heard the language being spoken in the community or in the schools he attended.

Volunteering at Sŵn Festival in Cardiff in 2014 and listening to Welsh language music rekindled his interest. He created a website called Minty's Gig Guide to promote Welsh-language gigs across South Wales and ran a series of successful campaigns.

He has presented with Bethan Elfyn on BBC Radio Wales, having previously worked for the corporation as a broadcast assistant.

Daniel enrolled on a Welsh Language Entry course in September 2022 and hasn't looked back. He achieved the Foundation qualification, is working towards Intermediate level and plans to progress to Advanced level.

He says he's "greatly indebted" to his tutors Elin Prys Davies and Meilyr ap Ifan at Learn Welsh Cardiff and Nigel Rees at Coleg Sir Gâr for their encouragement and passion for the language.

Keen to share his own passion for Welsh, he has helped other learners by organising informal chat and reading groups and even inspired his sister and brother-in-law to learn the language.

It was Elin who encouraged Daniel to apply for a job with Menter Iaith Casnewydd and nominated him for the award.

"Undoubtedly, learning Welsh has transformed Daniel's life," she said. "He's an energetic individual who inspires everyone around him to learn Welsh. His enthusiasm is infectious. His aim is to promote, encourage and inspire the residents of Newport to learn Welsh, use the language skills they have and, more than anything, to delight in the language and enjoy speaking it."

### Innovate Trust / UNISON Cymru Wales Learning Partnership

Mae prosiect WULF UNISON, a ariennir gan Lywodraeth Cymru, wedi ymrwymo i ddarparu gweminarau a chyrsiau wyneb yn wyneb i weithwyr gofal cymdeithasol, mewn partneriaeth â chyflwynwyr a thrwy ei rhaglen gweminar trwy Gymru gyfan.

Gweithiodd Jenny Griffin, o UNISON, yn glos gyda'r rheolwyr i negodi rhaglen o gyrsiau, sy'n cael eu cyflwyno yn amser gwaith gyda'r staff yn cael eu talu a'u rhyddhau i'w mynychu.

"Mae'r cytundeb yn dangos i'n haelodau bod y cyflwynwr am weithio gyda'r undeb i roi blaenoriaeth i ddysgu ac mae'n dangos nad rhywbedd am un tro yn unig oedd y cyrsiau – mae dysgu yn mynd i ddigwydd trwy'r amser nawr," dywedodd Jenny.

Cyflwynwyd cam cychwynnol y tri chwrs Lefel 1 laith Arwyddion Prydain gan Addysg Oedolion Cymru trwy gydol 2023, gyda chwrs Lefel 2 dilynol i alluogi staff i barhau i ddatblygu eu sgiliau newydd. Roedd y cyrsiau hyn wedi eu cyd-ariannu gan y prosiect WULF a'r cyflwynwr, gyda 68 o ddysgwyr yn cymryd rhan.

**A suggestion from a staff member attending a course has led to a ground-breaking new partnership that is equipping her colleagues with inclusive skills now being delivered across a huge part of South Wales.**

Innovate Trust is a not-for-profit disability support organisation supplying services throughout the Vale of Glamorgan, Rhondda Cynon Taf and Cardiff.

One employee engaged with a webinar organised by her union, UNISON's Wales Union Learning Fund (WULF) and following this, she asked if the course could be offered to more of her colleagues.

Unison's WULF project, funded by Welsh Government, is committed to providing social care workers with dedicated webinars and face-to-face courses, both in partnership with employers and through its all-Wales webinar programme.

Jenny Griffin, from UNISON, worked closely with management to negotiate a programme of courses, delivered in work time with staff paid and released to attend.

"The agreement shows our members that the employer wants to work with the union to prioritise learning and demonstrates that the courses weren't a one-off – learning is going to be happening all the time now," said Jenny.

An initial phase of three British Sign Language Level 1 courses were delivered by Adult Learning Wales throughout 2023, with a follow-on Level 2 course to enable staff to continue developing their new-found skills. These courses were co-funded by the WULF project and the employer, with 68 learners taking part.

The second stage was delivery of bespoke Time Management and Managing Difficult Conversations courses, funded through the union's exclusive member learning offer. This led to increased union membership, giving more workers union protection and access to UNISON college courses.

Innovate Trust has now appointed two new union learning representatives to support colleagues and ensure union-led learning is a part of its DNA.

Donna Miller, Innovate Trust Training Manager, said: "The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive with our learners reporting that their new skills have been warmly received by individuals who use our services, increasing confidence and improving communication."

An Official Learning Agreement was signed last autumn to reinforce the importance of workplace learning. It has become a model for how UNISON and social care employers can work together to make courses available to non-traditional learners.

The pioneering partnership has been praised by UNISON Regional Manager, Andy Rutherford, who said: "Social care workers are at the heart of our union and this initiative builds their skills and confidence directly helping the people, families, and communities that Innovate Trust supports."



# Inas Alali

**Mae'r gwrthdaro yn Syria wedi lladd dros 600,000 o bobl gyda miliynau wedi eu dadleoli ac yn dal heb rywle i'w alw yn gartref.**

Gor fodwyd llawer i ffoi o'u gwlad ar ôl i'w bywydau gael eu bygwth, ac i Inas Alali, roedd yn rhaid iddi wneud hynny ar ei phen ei hun yn dilyn marwolaeth ei gŵr.

Roedd yr athrawes a'i dau blentyn ifanc yn wynebu dyfodol ansicr yn ei "hannwyl" wlad, gan ei gadael heb unrhyw ddewis ond chwilio am hafan cdiogel lle gallai ganfod diogelwch.

"Roeddwn wedi gweithio ym maes addysg ers 16 mlynedd yn fy Syria annwyl, ond ar ôl marwolaeth fy ngŵr ac i'r rhyfel gychwyn, roedd fy mywyd, a bywydau fy mhlant dan fygythiad," dywedodd Inas, a ddaeth i Gaerdydd yn 2019 trwy raglen froaduriad y Cenhedloedd Unedig.

Penderfynodd ail ddeffro ei hangerdd dros addysg, ond er bod ganddi radd Saesneg, dim ond ail iaith oedd hi o hyd ac nid oedd yn ddigon da i addysgu yng Nghymru.

Felly fe wnaeth Inas ddwy flynedd o waith dysgu gwirfoddol i wella ei Saesneg, cyn mynd ati i ddychwelyd i addysgu amser llawn trwy ymgeisio am y Dystygrif Myfyrwyr Graddedig Proffesiynol mewn Addysg Ôl Addysg a Hyfforddiant Gorfodol, sy'n ofyn ar gyfer unrhyw athro tramor sydd am ddod i mewn i system addysg ôl 16 Prydain.

Gwnaeth hanes ei chefnidir argraff ar Brifysgol Metropolitan Caerdydd lle derbyniwyd hi i'w

hamgylchedd gynhwysol yn groesawgar, gan roi cyfle iddi gymhwysio i addysgu addysg a hyfforddiant ôl 16.

Leanne Davies oedd ei thiwtor cwrs, sy'n cofio: "Roedd hi mor ddewr gan gynnig golwg i mi ar yr amgylchiadau ofnadwy oedd yn newid bywyd a ddaeth â hi i Gaerdydd.

"Roedd yn gadarnhaol trwy'r cyfan ac fe wnaeth ymgysylltu â nifer o wersi tiwtorial a pheirianweithiau cymorth i wella ei hun yn barhaus a chyrraedd y safon broffesiynol ofynnol i addysgu mewn addysg ôl 16."

Er mwyn cynnal ei theulu a thalu am eu llety, roedd gan Inas ddwy swydd ran-amser gan gynnwys dysgu Arabeg yng Nghanolfan Arabaidd Fayza, roedd yn jyglo hyn i gyd wrth iddi barhau i astudio.

Gyda chefnogaeth gan ei mentoriaid, mae wedi cwblhau ei horiau addysgu ffurfiol i gymhwysio ac erbyn hyn mae'n addysgu mathemateg i oedolion yn ACT Training, gan barhau i addysgu Arabeg yn rhan-amser.

Ar ôl gweld ei gwlad yn cael ei rhwygo'n ddarnau, mae Inas yn disgrifio Prifysgol Metropolitan Caerdydd fel "Prifysgol Noddfa" am fod yn "sefydliad amrywiol a chynhwysol iawn" ac mae'n ychwanegu y bydd yn parhau ei hastudiaethau i lunio dyfodol hyd yn oed yn well iddi hi a'i phlant.

*"Roeddwn i yn un o'r rhai ffodus. Fe wnes i gyrraedd Caerdydd heb wybod llawer iawn am ddiwylliant Cymru. Ond mae Cymru wedi fy nghofleidio fel mam. Treuliais ddwy flynedd yn gwirfoddoli i wella fy hun ac i fod mewn sefyllfa lle gallwn gyfrannu at gymdeithas yma trwy ddod yn athro."*

*"I was one of the lucky ones. I arrived in Cardiff not really knowing much about Welsh culture. But Wales has embraced me like a mother. I spent two years volunteering to better myself and to be in a position where I could contribute to society here by becoming a teacher."*

**The Syrian conflict has killed over 600,000 people with millions more displaced and still without a place to call home.**

Many have been forced to flee their country after their lives were threatened, and for Inas Alali, she had to do it alone following the death of her husband.

The schoolteacher and her two young children faced an uncertain future in her "beloved" country, leaving her with no option but to seek a safe haven where she could find safety.

"I worked in the field of education for 16 years in my beloved Syria, but after the death of my husband and the outbreak of war, my life, and the lives of my children, were under threat," said Inas, who found her way to Cardiff in 2019 through the United Nations refugee programme.

She decided to rekindle her passion for education, but despite holding a degree in English, it was a second language and not up to the standard for teaching in Wales.

So Inas undertook two years of volunteer teaching work to improve her English, before pursuing a return to full-time teaching by applying for the Professional Graduate Certificate in Education Post Compulsory Education and Training (PGCE PCET), a requirement for any overseas teacher wanting to enter the British post-16 education system.

Her back story impressed Cardiff Metropolitan University where she was embraced into their inclusive environment with open arms, allowing her to qualify to teach post-16 education and training.

Her course tutor was Leanne Davies who recalls: "She was so courageous and offered me an insight into the awful and life changing circumstances that had brought her to Cardiff.

"She remained positive throughout and engaged with many tutorials and support mechanisms to continually improve herself and reach the required professional standard to teach in post-16 education."

To support her family and pay for their accommodation, Inas held two part-time jobs including teaching Arabic at Fayza Arabic Centre, she juggled all of this whilst she continued to study.

With support from her mentors, she has completed her formal teaching hours to qualify and now teaches maths to adults at ACT Training, whilst continuing to teach Arabic part-time.

After seeing her country torn apart, Inas describes Cardiff Metropolitan University the "University of Sanctuary" for being a "very diverse and inclusive institution" and adds that she will continue her studies to build an even better future for her children and herself.

Yno y cychwynnodd taith ddysgu Tony yn ei wyltdegau. Er ei fod yn gweld yr astudio a'r ymchwil yn ddiddorol, roedd ei sgiliau cyfrifiadurol 20 mlynedd allan ohoi.

Mae'n cofio: "Wrth i Covid ddechrau cloi'r Deyrnas Unedig, roeddwn ar goll. Roeddwn yn ddyn 84 oed prysur iawn ac nid oeddwn yn edrych ymlaen at gael fy nghaethiwo ac yn unig. Fe'm darbwyllyd gan y teulu i gyflawni un o uchelgeisiau fy mywyd, a dechreuaus astudio am radd gyda'r Brifysgol Agored a chychwyn ar fy nhaith ddarganfod rithwir."

Gyda chefnogaeth werthfawr ei ddarllithwyr cysylltiedig mewn gwersi tiwtorial a gyda'r adborth parhaus am ei asesiadau, llwyddodd Tony i loywi ei sgiliau TG ac astudio yn ogystal ag ehangu ei wybodaeth academaidd.

Gwnaeth ei thad gymaint o argraff ar ei ferch, Diane, fel ei bod wedi ei enwebu am y wobr.

"Rydym wedi bod yn dyst i'r trawsnewidiad y mae fy nhad wedi ei brofi trwy astudio gyda'r Brifysgol Agored," dywedodd.

"Er ei bod hi'n cymryd ddwywaith yr amser iddo wneud nodiadau, ysgrifennu ei aseiniadau a'r ymchwil, mae wrth ei fod yn astudio ac yn dweud ei fod yn difaru na fyddai wedi gwneud hyn flynyddoedd yn ôl. Mae'n credu'n wirioneddol bod dysgu wedi ychwanegu flynyddoedd at ei oes ac mae'n dystiolaeth i hyn yn gyson. "Mewn archwiliad meddygol yn ddiweddar, roedd y meddyg yn cytuno bod cadw mor feddyliol effro, yn drefnus ac â diddordeb yn ei astudiaethau wedi helpu iechyd meddwl fy nhad, ei gof a'i lesiant yn gyffredinol."

"Rwy'n hyderus bod Covid, i mi'n bersonol, yn drobwynt yn fy mywyd, a fydd gyda help fy nhwatoriaid rhyfeddol, yn arwain at seremoni raddio," ychwanegodd Tony.

## Tony Morton has graduated with a degree in history at the age of 87!

The former Rolls Royce engineering apprentice, who went on to become director of a group of companies in Northwest England, began studying for a degree during the Covid pandemic lockdown three years ago.

He had been hastily flown back to the UK from Portugal and was confined to his Cardiff flat. His daughter and son-in-law suggested a degree would be good way to occupy his time.

There began Tony's learning journey as an octogenarian. Whilst he found the studying and research interesting, his computer skills were 20 years out of date.

He recalls: "As Covid began to lock up the UK, I was at a loss. I was a very active 84-year-old not looking forward to being locked up and lonely. Persuaded by family to fulfil one of my life's ambitions, I began to study a degree with the OU and set out on my virtual voyage of discovery."

With invaluable support from his associate lecturers at tutorials and with ongoing assignment feedback, Tony was able to refresh his IT and study skills as well as widen his academic knowledge.

Tony's daughter, Diane was so impressed by her dad that she nominated him for the award.

"We have witnessed the transformation that my father has experienced through studying with the OU," she said.

"Although it takes him twice as long to make notes, write assignments and research, he loves to study and says he wishes he had done this years ago. He truly believes that learning has added years to his life and continuously attests to this. "At a recent medical, the doctor agreed that keeping so mentally alert, organised and engaged with studies has helped dad's mental health, memory and general well-being."

"Last year, he walked Hadrian's Wall, before that Offa's Dyke and before that the length of the UK, in between studying!"

Having enjoyed broadening his knowledge, Tony says he has been bitten by the "history bug" and aims to continue studying.

"I am confident that Covid was, to me personally, a turning point in my life that, with help from my amazing tutors, will result in a degree ceremony," added Tony.

Trodd Stephen, 46, o Gasnewydd, at dim dysgu Undeb y GMB i ofyn am help a chafodd ddiagnosis o ddyslecsia difrifol a chyflyrau niwrowahanol eraill o bosibl, sy'n effeithio ar leferydd ac yn gwneud rhngweithio cymdeithasol yn anodd.

Trwy sesiynau un i un gyda thiwtoriaid, mae yn awr yn dysgu i ddarllen ac ysgrifennu. Mae'n ategu at ei wersi llythrennedd wythnosol gyda gwaith cartref ac mae am wella ei sgiliau ddigon i allu anfon negeseuon testun a chael trwydded periant codi.

Pan gollodd ei swydd mewn siop Wilko, lle'r oedd wedi gweithio ers mwy nag 20 mlynedd, roedd Stephen yn poeni y byddai ei anallu i ddarllen ac ysgrifennu yn rhwystr rhag dod o hyd i waith, ond fe gafodd ei swydd bresennol yn Tomoe Valve Ltd, Casnewydd cyn pen wythnos.

Er mwyn ad-dalu am y gefnogaeth barhaus y mae'n ei chael, rhedodd Stephen ras 10k yn Ninbych-y-pysgod godi mwy na £1,500 i helpu dysgwyr dyslecsig eraill.

"Rwyf hefyd am ddysgu digon fel fy mod yn gallu anfon negeseuon ar ffôn, oherwydd mae fy lleferydd yn wael ac ni allaf arddweud. Mae gennyd rwydwaith da o bobl o'm cwmpas sy'n fy nysgu a'm cefnogi. Hebbyn nhw fyddwn i ddim yma.

"Fy nghyngor i unrhyw un sy'n meddwl am ddysgu yw ewch a gwnewch hynny, peidiwch â bod ofn. Mae help allan yna i bobl fel fi."

Dyweddodd Vincent Board o Undeb y GMB: "Wrth i Stephen barhau ar ei daith addysgol, mae'r trawsnewidiad ynddo o unigolyn swil i rywun sy'n angerddol dros ddysgu yn dyst i'w wytnwch a'i benderfyniad i oresgyr rhwystrau. Mae'n ysbrydoli eraill i ddilyn eu llwybrau eu hunain at hunan-welliant ac ymrymuso."

**Stephen Reynolds was inspired to get support to learn to read and write after hearing a speaker at a GMB Congress talk about his own challenges with literacy.**

Stephen, 46, from Newport, turned to GMB Union's learning team for help and was diagnosed with severe dyslexia and potentially other neurodiverse conditions, which impact his speech and make social interactions difficult.

Through one-on-one sessions with tutors, he is now learning to read and write. He supplements his weekly literacy learning lessons with homework assignments and wants to improve his skills enough to be able to send texts and obtain a forklift licence.

When he lost his job at a Wilko store, where he had worked for more than 20 years, Stephen feared that his inability to read and write would be a barrier to finding employment, but he secured his current post at Tomoe Valve Ltd, Newport within a week.

To repay the ongoing support he receives, Stephen completed a 10k run in Tenby to raise more than £1,500 to help other dyslexic learners.

"I left school with no qualifications and thought, because I was older, I would never be able to read and write and no one would help me," said Stephen. "That changed

when I heard the speaker at the GMB Congress who had been in the same boat as me. Learning to read and write changed his life and I wanted to learn and change mine."

"I got help from my union and they found me a brilliant tutor. I love learning, can't wait for each lesson and want to be able to read bills, text messages, newspapers, labels and things in shops, so I can shop on my own.

"I also want to learn enough so that I can send messages on a phone, because my speech is poor and I cannot dictate. I have a good network of people around me who teach and support me. Without them I wouldn't be here.

"My advice to anyone thinking of learning is just go and do it, don't be afraid. There is help out there for people like me."

Vincent Board from GMB Union said: "As Stephen continues on his educational journey, his transformation from a reserved individual to a passionate advocate for learning serves as a testament to his resilience and determination to overcome obstacles. He is inspiring others to pursue their own paths to self-improvement and empowerment."
